



## Nancy Erickson to Speak at January Meeting

Nancy Erickson, a member of the Toledo Troopers, "the winningest team in Pro Football History" will talk about a new book published about the team that includes her: We Are The Troopers by Stephen Guinan. An outstanding athlete, she had already been hired to direct Arcadia's Recreation Department when she had a chance to try out for the Toledo Troopers. The City of Arcadia held the job for her until she played her first and only season.

At the January meeting, she will talk about her experience in the National Women's Football League as well as her work in Arcadia. For example, the federal civil rights law enacted as part of the Education Amendments of 1972 and most commonly known as Title IX helped Nancy to start girls sports teams of all kinds in Arcadia. She will have copies of the book to sell and sign.

### Tidbit from the Past

From the Thursday, Jan. 9, 1908, The Champion, p. 1:

## "Leads In Oranges: Arcadia As Seen by New York Packer's Man

"Arcadia, the capitol of DeSoto County, is indeed an Arcadian city, although at the present time, while the harvest of the orange is in progress, rest and pleasure are not so much in evidence as during the season of bloom and growth.

"Since the fire of 1905, which destroyed fully half of the business portion of the town, Arcadia has made some wonderful improvements in building up a city with brick, cement, and stone. Its streets are well paved. Its four banks and fine stores and business houses are equal if not superior to anything of the kind in the State. Its two newspapers, *The Champion* and the *DeSoto County News* are up-to-date publications and a credit to any city while the town has a general appearance of solidity which causes one to feel like wishing to live here always and calling it home.

"Arcadia is said to be the largest orange shipping station in Florida, its shipments last season reaching 250,000 boxes and while this season will fall much short of the above figure yet it is claimed the records of being the largest orange growing center in the state will not be broken even this year . . . " (https://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/lccn/sn95047227/1908-01-09/ed-1/seq-1).
