Pioneer Day – March 23 – we'll be looking for YOU!

Please gather with the Society to celebrate our county's history and heritage during the Society's 20th Annual Pioneer Day and BBQ with the Arcadia American Legion sponsored Antique Tractor and Hit & Miss Engine Show—plus United We Roll Car Club Car Show—from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Sat., March 23, at the Turner Agri-Civic Center, 2250 NE Roan St.

This family-fun festival will commemorate the centennial anniversary of the Arcadia Tourist Camp—now the City Mobile Home Park—and over 50 feet of historic photographs and other memorabilia will be on display. Society President Adrian H. Cline will present a certificate of congratulations to the City of Arcadia Mayor Robert W. Heine, Jr., during a centennial commemoration ceremony at noon.

The Society will also celebrate the centennial anniversary of the bridge over Peace River built in 1924 by the Lutén Bridge Company as well as of the classic 1924 LaFrance fire engine owned by the City of Arcadia. It will be on display at the festival, and the DeSoto County Fire Department will have a fire hose demonstration and host an exhibit about how a fire destroyed downtown Arcadia in 1905.

DeSoto County Property Appraiser David Williams will have searchable digital copies of the historic tax rolls, and the DeSoto County Sheriff's office will present its history. Charlotte County Libraries and History Services, Mount Ephraim Baptist Church, Pine Level Church, and Sebring Historical Society will showcase their history, and other organizations will offer information about their work in the community.

Before 1949, cattle roamed freely through Florida's frontier, so cowmen camped on the prairie to accomplish their annual round-ups. Working and retired cattlemen will set up a traditional cow camp—complete with animals—and share their stories. Whip crackers will display their skill that gave rise to the name "Florida Cracker."



Pioneer Day – March 23 – we'll be looking for YOU!

During the opening ceremony, Dr. Sharon Goodman will sing the National Anthem while the DeSoto High School JROTC cadets present the colors, and the Rev. Jerry Waters will give the invocation. Musicians John Bois, George Hausman, Dennis Mader, Keith Mathys, Johnny Shannon, Vgo, and Rita Youngman—a member of the Seminole Tribe of Florida—will perform on the Turner Center stage.

Also making an appearance are legendary characters Arcadia Albritton Coker—the woman who had a town named for her because she baked a cake—and Acrefoot Johnson who walked 60 miles in one day to deliver the mail between Fort Ogden and Fort Meade.

Pioneer Day offers bodacious barbecue, luscious strawberry shortcake, home-baked goods, jams, jellies, and other tasty treats as well as traditional Florida foods, such as boiled peanuts.



Demonstrators will show off their pioneer skills in wood carving and crafting, toy making, tatting, spinning, rag-rug making, quilting, butter churning, and more—both inside and outside the Turner Center. The Hands-on History area will offer the opportunity for festival-goers to try some of those activities for themselves as well as old-fashioned games and a fossil dig.

Books by local authors, hand-crafted cottage goods, hand-painted ceramics, leatherwork, jewelry, organic soap, plants, wooden items, worm-casting compost and more will be available for purchase.

Banking On The Past

We appreciate Carol Mahler for making an exhibit about the DeSoto National Bank of Arcadia for the display case in the lobby of Truist Bank, 10 S. DeSoto Ave. She scanned historic photographs, counter checks, and other documents plus she included some artifacts—such as a drawstring depot bag and a pencil topped with a wood football and printed with the DeSoto County High School football games for the 1964 season. Chartered in 1907 by W. G. Welles and his brother B. F. Welles, the DeSoto National Bank of Arcadia has had plenty of different

names over the years, including Sun Bank, Sun Trust, and now Truist. Located where the parking on Oak St. is today, the original building was torn down in 1974.



History of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church

Thanks to Pastor Louis C. Anderson, Jr., for attending the membership meeting on Feb. 19 and sharing the history of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church, 304 W. Myrtle St., in Arcadia.

In 1910, the Reverend Oscar Middleton transformed a house that he owned on the corner of W. Myrtle St. and Hector Ave. into Friendship Missionary Baptist Church and served as pastor. The church’s founding members were Middleton, the Rev. Willie Bell, the Rev. William Robinson, Deacon Herbert Carlton, and Sister Emma Griffin.

After the death of Middleton, the Rev. Willie Bell became pastor, followed by the Rev. C. J. Jones. He supervised the addition of a kitchen and dining room to the church building. In 1963, the Rev. Jones resigned, and Rev. P. V. Bowen became pastor. In 1976, the old church was torn down and a new structure—including a baptismal pool—was built, and church furniture was purchased.

In 1977, the Rev. Bowen became ill, and remained as “pastor emeritus” until he was no longer able to attend. In his place, the Rev. James Wells, Sr., became pastor, and in 1978, the mortgage was burned. Pastor Wells served until his death in 2008.

In 2009, the Rev. Louis C. Anderson, Jr., was elected pastor, and he continues to serve as pastor/teacher/leader of the church. In 2014, the church was incorporated.
